The British public have voted that the UK should leave the EU The EU Referendum vote (the Leave Vote) does not by itself result in an automatic UK exit from the EU The EU Treaty provides for a framework for a “Brexit” to become legally effective over a period of years Until then, UK

Places with many EU migrants tended to be less likely to vote Leave Lastly, taking into account these factors the Leave vote was noticeably lower in London and Scotland The results for Scotland are especially striking - the Leave vote was 22 points lower than what might have been expected given the level of immigration and educational
